Movies as Trendsetters of Generations



CUPPINGBody Massage Therapy

upping body massage therapy is an ancient form of alternative therapy where cups are placed on the skin to create suction. This technique is believed to relieve muscle tension and pain, improve blood flow and circulation, reduce inflammation, promote relaxation and reduce stress, enhance flexibility and range of motion. This therapy is not much known to people at present times and so it's not much in use in the parlours or has reached the common people about the benefits.

During a cupping session, the cups

are typically placed on specific areas of the body, such as the back, shoulders, or legs. The suction created by the cups helps to:

- Loosen tight muscles
- Increase blood flow
- Stimulate the lymphatic system

Cupping therapy can be performed using different techniques, including:

Dry cupping: Cups are placed on the skin without any incisions.

Wet cupping: Cups are placed on the skin after small incisions are

made to draw out blood.

Fire cupping: Cups are heated with fire to create suction.

This therapy is often used in conjunction with other treatments, such as massage, acupuncture, or physical therapy, to enhance its benefits. Some people find cupping helpful for managing pain, stress, and athletic recovery.

This therapy is used in many countries around the world, particularly in Asia and the Middle East.

- China: Cupping is a mainstay of government-sponsored hospitals of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM), with extensive research carried out on its benefits.
- Japan: Famous for its massage therapy, Japan has numerous spa and massage centers that offer cupping therapy, especially in cities like Tokyo and Beppu.
- Thailand: Known for its luxurious spas and traditional Thai massages, Thailand is a popular destination for cupping therapy, with many resorts and wellness centers offering this treatment.
- Indonesia: Bali is a hub for traditional spas and wellness centers, offering cupping therapy as part of its rejuvenating spa packages.
- Philippines: Ventosa cupping massage therapy is a wellknown treatment in the Philippines, particularly in Cebu City.

- India: Ayurvedic treatments, including cupping therapy, are popular in India, particularly in Kerala and Rishikesh.
- Germany: Germany has many luxurious spa resorts that offer cupping therapy as part of their wellness packages.
- Italy: Italy is home to many luxurious spas, such as the Acquaforte Thalasso Spa, which offers cupping therapy and other wellness treatments.

AAFPA Secretary Bikram Borpatra said, "AAFPA aims to create a professional platform for fashion




photographers in Assam." With Fashion Click, we are celebrating World Photography Day to empower our photographers to compete, collaborate, and make their mark nationally and globally.

IKIRU Joie de vivre

"I can't afford to hate people. I don't have that kind of time...How beautiful! Truly beautiful. A sunset. I don't think I've really looked at one in 30 years!..."

- Watanabe in Ikiru

ver since the beginning of time, humanity has been haunted by the inevitability of death. However, the presence of death has never made people fixate above the rest. There is so much more to life than just waiting for death. There is life's journey, the meaning of which has to be enriched with beauty and dignity. Every human soul, bewitched or otherwise, dreams about ennobling the sways of its existence or, at the very least, leaving behind an enduring legacy in the form of a purpose. The Japanese film master Akira Kurosawa, for example, directed with a philosophical bent and in Something Like An Autobiography remarked:

"I am not a special person, I am not especially strong; I am not especially gifted. I simply do not like to show my weakness, and I hate to lose, so I am a person who tries hard. That's all there is to me."

His drive for humility and relentless striving is steeped within the ecosystem of his 1952 masterpiece *Ikiru* (translated as, To Live). Of the countless Kurosawa works that light up the night sky of cinema, there is none so singularly radiant as *Ikiru*

The most memorable critiques, as well as the most laudatory diatribes in cinemas, have celebrated it as the pinnacle of creation, as a piece of work that squeezes the weight of deeper philosophical reflection from the simple narrative of a simple man. Martin Scorsese recalled the time watched the film, and explained, "From all the films that I have seen, none has impacted



me as much as 'lkiru', a film about a man suffering from cancer and searching for a purpose in life. Watching that film is one of the most emotionally intense experiences I have had in my teenage years."

Watanabe Kanji, the main character of Ikiru, portrayed by Takashi Shimura with delicate and haunting subtlety, is a fatigued bureaucrat. His life is a monotonous cycle of shuffling through files in a hopeless office. His life takes a sharper turn for the worse as he is diagnosed with terminal stomach cancer. In a way, he is the one to begin waging battle against some of the most fundamental questions of modern living—'what does one's life mean when one's death is aspiring to come?'.

Kurosawa's approach to Watanabe's story is not melodramatic; rather, his journey is an odyssey through the stages of despair, denial, distraction, and ultimately, awakening. Watanabe was initially left to solitude by a cold and heartless family, and was drifting in despair. Even his nights which promised drunken escapism and shallow company of strangers could not provide him solace.

The arrival of the young woman Toyo, whose laughter radiates as if the sun has decided to sing, awakes something in him. It is her bright spirit that gives him the will to act — to etch a semblance of permanence in his transitory life. The mission he sets out for is deceptively simple: to turn a noxious dump into a children's park. That single selfless act of service, not from a place of grand design but simple grace, is the redemption he claims as life's answer to death's indifference.

Ikiru's strength is not confined to the story alone but to Kurosawa's masterful direction — the unification of image, pace, and sound to create a profoundly human piece of music. Asakazu Nakai's cinematography depicts a world of visual contrasts. In the film's early scenes, Watanabe struggles with shadows, his body diminished by stacks of stagnant papers, trapped within the sterile uniformity of office buildings. The static framing, the subdued lighting, the never-ending bureaucratic hallways



serve as symbols of spiritual stagnation. But as Watanabe's spirit starts to awaken, the imagery changes: the children's park shines with openness, light, and air — a cinematic exhale of freedom.

The lasting image, from the film is Watanabe sitting alone on a swing as snowflakes fall softly around him. It's a moment that stays with you becoming a part of your memory like a thought. As he sways gently the fragility of life is almost overwhelming. The snow falls, silent and unhurried reminding us that our time is short.. Yet in its calmness the snow also brought a sense of peace. It's a scene one that captured the contradictory nature of human existence. In this fleeting instant, life and death joy and sorrow become two sides of the coin.

Fumio Hayasaka's score is just as crucial, with its mournful notes that resonate deeply with Watanabe's struggle. The music is sparse yet powerful capturing the despair that weighs him down and then in moments of determination it swells with a beauty. One of the moving moments comes when Watanabe breaks into song his voice cracking as he sings "Gondola no Uta" a tune that drives home the fleeting nature of life. This old worn song, fractured by time and pain tells a story. Explores the questions. Its the core of what Kurosawa was trying to say. Life is short. Thats not something to be sad, about. Instead we should fill it with things that give it purpose.

The impact of *Ikiru* can be seen long after the credits roll. Its mes-

sage is still felt today echoing in films, like Hrishikesh Mukherjees 'Anand', an movie that shares its warmth and compassion. Decades later Oliver Hermanuss Living brought this story to a generation earning prestigious awards and proving that a simple yet powerful tale of self discovery can bridge gaps, between cultures and time.

Ikiru ultimately gives us affirmation rather than hopelessness. Kurosawa serves as a reminder that death is a mirror that calls us to awaken to life rather than

merely an end. He contends that death is life's most unyielding teacher rather than its enemy. We are forced to explore what it means to live authentically by gazing into its certainty. Ikiru is therefore more than just a movie about dying. Above all, it is an ode to life itself, which is brittle, short, and incredibly valuable. 
50th Anniversary NFDC (1975-2025)

Celebration of 50 years of innumerable stories that shaped the destiny of meaningful cinema in India © by film critic Lalit Rao (FIPRESCI)

he National Film Development Corporation (NFDC), founded in 1975 by the Government of India, has played a defining role in shaping Indian cinema beyond mainstream conventions. Its mandate was to support quality films that struggled to find space in a marketplace dominated by commercial Hindi productions and overlooked regional cinema. NFDC filled this void by encouraging artistic, experimental, and socially relevant storytelling, creating a platform for filmmakers with unconventional voices.

Champion of parallel cinema movement in India

In its formative years, NFDC became a cornerstone of the parallel cinema movement, supporting filmmakers such as Shyam Benegal, Govind Nihalani, Mani Kaul, and Ketan Mehta. Cult films like "Jaane



Bhi Do Yaaron" (1983), "Mirch Masala" (1987), and "Ek Doctor Ki Maut" (1990) became milestones in alternative storytelling. Regional voices also found recognition,



with Jahnu Barua's "Aparoopa" (1982) and Buddhadeb Dasgupta's "Tahader Katha" (1992) emerging as gems of Assamese and Bengali cinema. On the world stage, NFDC

co-produced Richard Attenborough's "Gandhi" (1982) and Mira Nair's "Salaam Bombay"! (1988), both Oscar nominees, securing international prestige.

Challenges and reinvention of NFDC

By the late 1990s and early 2000s, NFDC's influence waned. The rise of multiplex culture, private studios, and shifting audience preferences diminished its relevance, while financial hurdles compounded the crisis. Yet the organization reinvented itself by focusing on film restoration, digital outreach, and global collaborations. A turning point came with the launch of Film Bazaar in 2007. Now touted as South Asia's largest film market, it connects Indian talent with international producers, distributors, and festival curators, significantly boosting India's cinematic footprint abroad.

NFDC in current times

In 2020, NFDC merged with the Films Division, Directorate of Film Festivals, and Children's Film Society India, consolidating resources under one umbrella. The corporation continues to champion inclusivity by supporting films in a wide range of Indian languagesfrom mainstream Hindi to tribal tongues. Projects such as Qissa (2013) and Karken (2024) reflect its ongoing commitment to contemporary, socially engaged cinema. Looking forward, NFDC aims to expand into digitization, streaming collaborations, and nurturing young filmmakers, while continuing to restore classics and preserve cinematic heritage. In a world

dominated by algorithms and franchise-driven entertainment, its mission to foster diversity and creativity remains indispensable.

Some landmark production helmed by NFDC

Over nearly five decades, NFDC has curated an exceptional portfolio of films. Highlights include Kundan Shah's satirical masterpiece "Jaane Bhi Do Yaaron" (1983), Ketan Mehta's feminist classic "Mirch Masala" (1987), Kalpana Lajmi's "Rudaali" (1993), and Mira Nair's Oscar-nominated "Salaam Bombay"! (1988). It also backed



Anup Singh's "Qissa" (2013), Mani Kaul's "Nazar" (1991), and K. Hariharan's "Current" (1992). Regional storytelling thrived through Jahnu Barua's "Aparoopa" (1982) and Sudhir Mishra's "Main Zinda Hoon" (1988). Socially conscious works like Saeed Akhtar Mirza's "Salim Langde Pe Mat Ro" (1989), Tapan Sinha's "Ek Doctor Ki Maut" (1990), and Sudhir Mishra's "Dharavi" (1991) remain significant. NFDC's collaborations with Shvam Benegal vielded "Surai Ka Satvan Ghoda" (1992), "Mammo" (1994), and "The Making of the Mahatma" (1996). It also enabled Pamela Rooks' "Train to Pakistan" (1998), Rajat Kapoor's quirky "Raghu Romeo" (2003), and Buddhadeb Dasgupta's "Tahader Katha" (1992). On the global front, it co-produced Richard Attenborough's Oscar-winning "Gandhi" (1982) and most recently supported Nending Loder's "Karken" (2024). Together, these films illustrate NFDC's unmatched contribution to Indian cinema-nurturing alternative voices, promoting regional diversity, and ensuring that stories of artistic and social value continue to reach audiences worldwide.

In 2025, NFDC celebrates 50 years of shaping Indian cinema beyond boundaries. Since 1975, it has nurtured parallel cinema, regional voices, and globally acclaimed films, while adapting to new technologies and platforms. NFDC's golden jubilee honors its legacy of creativity, inclusivity, and innovation in storytelling.



You remained in my soul.


You were no more a mirage, but a devine feeling in me.
